CEQA Appeal Rights under Chapter 31 of the San Francisco Administrative Code: If the Commission's action on a project constitutes the Approval Action for that project (as defined in S.F. Administrative Code Chapter 31, as amended, Board of Supervisors Ordinance Number 161-13), then the CEQA determination prepared in support of that Approval Action is thereafter subject to appeal within the time frame specified in S.F. Administrative Code Section 31.16. Typically, an appeal must be filed within 30 calendar days of the Approval Action for a project that has received an exemption or negative declaration pursuant to CEQA. For information on filing an appeal under Chapter 31, contact the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors at City Hall, 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Place, Room 244, San Francisco, CA 94102, or call (415) 554-5184. If the Planning Department's Environmental Review Officer has deemed a project to be exempt from further environmental review, an exemption determination has been prepared and can be obtained on-line at <a href="http://www.sf-planning.org/index.aspx?page=3447">http://www.sf-planning.org/index.aspx?page=3447</a>. Under CEQA, in a later court challenge, a litigant may be limited to raising only those issues previously raised at a hearing on the project or in written correspondence delivered to the Board of Supervisors, Planning Commission, Planning Department or San Francisco Public Utilities Commission at, or prior to, such hearing, or as part of the appeal hearing process on the CEQA decision.

- 8. All matters listed hereunder constitute a Consent Calendar are considered routine by the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission and will be acted upon by a single vote of the Commission.   - a) Approve Modification No. 1 to <u>Job Order Contract</u>, <u>JOC-78R</u>, Micro-LBE Set Aside, General Engineering (A-License) San Joaquin, Stanislaus and Tuolumne Counties, with Peterson Excavation, Inc., to complete ongoing facility and asset improvements, increasing the contract amount by \$1,000,000 for a total not-to-exceed contract amount of \$3,000,000, and increasing the contract duration by

- three years for a total contract duration of five years, in accordance with San Francisco Administrative Code 6.62(h). (Johanson)
- b) Accept work performed by Ranger Pipelines Inc. for Contract No. WD-2829R, San Andreas Pipeline No. 2 Replacement; approve Modification No. 20 (Final), decreasing the contract amount by \$570,418 for a total contract amount of \$32,758,582, with no change to the contract duration of 730 consecutive days (two years); and authorize final payment to the contractor. - c) Approve an increase of \$300,000 to the contract cost contingency and an increase of 365 calendar days to the contract duration contingency for <a href="Contract\_No.WD-2854A">Contract\_No.WD-2854A</a>, 525 Golden Gate Avenue Roof Access and Fall Protection; and authorize the General Manager to approve future modifications to the contract for a total contract amount of up to \$917,186 and a total contract duration of up to 750 consecutive calendar days (approximately two years). - d) Approve an increase of 250 consecutive calendar days to the contract duration contingency for <a href="Contract No. WD-2854B">Contract No. WD-2854B</a>,525 Golden Gate Avenue Tower Access and Fall Protection; and authorize the General Manager to approve future modifications to the contract for a total contract duration of up to 448 consecutive calendar days (approximately one year and three months) with no change to the contract amount.

- e) Accept work performed by Cal State Constructors for <a href="Contract No. WW-664">Contract No. WW-664</a>, North Point Wet Weather Facility Sedimentation Tank Influent Gate Upgrades; approve Modification No. 5 (Final), decreasing the contract amount by \$20,037, for a total contract amount of \$2,917,876, with no change to the contract duration of 785 consecutive calendar days (approximately two years and three months); and authorize final payment to the contractor.

- f) Accept work performed by Trinet Construction, Inc., for Contract No. WW-683R, Sansome, 5th, 6th (North), and Division Streets Combined Sewer Discharge Rehabilitation and Backflow Prevention; approve Modification No. 11 (final) increasing the contract amount by \$14,802 for additional work at the Sansome ceiling and influent columns for a total contract amount of \$6,611,833, and increasing the contract duration by 26 consecutive calendar days for a total contract duration of 587 consecutive calendar days (approximately one year and eight months); and authorize final payment to the contractor. - g) Accept work performed by Precision Engineering, Inc. for Contract No. WW-692, As-Needed Spot Sewer Replacement No. 39, approve Modification Nos. 1 and 2 (Final), decreasing the contract amount by \$6,021,664, for a total contract amount of \$2,155,296, with no change to the contract duration; and authorize final payment to the contractor. - h) Approve the plans and specifications, and award <u>Contract No. WW-714</u>, Ocean Beach Climate Change Adaptation, Short-term Erosion Mitigation, in the amount of \$3,134,000, and with a duration of 1,095 consecutive calendar days (approximately three years), to the responsible bidder submitting the lowest

responsive bid, Minerva Construction, Inc. to provide coastal erosion mitigation and protect critical wastewater treatment infrastructure, facilities, at the beach south of Sloat Boulevard to Skyline Boulevard within the City and County of San Francisco. (Johanson)

Adopt an <u>Untreated Wholesale Water Discount Factor</u> of \$0.36 per one hundred cubic feet for FY 2021-22 to be applied to Wholesale Customer Coastside County Water District (CCWD), in accordance with the terms of the 2009 Water Supply Agreement between the City and County of San Francisco and the Wholesale Customers, as amended and re-stated on December 11, 2018 by Resolution No. 18-0212, and the SFPUC's individual water sales contract with CCWD. - 11. Adopt findings declaring as surplus to the SFPUC's utility needs per Charter Section 8B.121 and as "surplus land" and "exempt surplus land" under the California Surplus Land Act approximately 262,553 square feet of unimproved agricultural property designated as a portion of SFPUC Parcel No. 65 and also designated as portions of Assessor Parcel Nos. 96-375-12-2, 96-375-6-11, 96-375-7-3, and 96-375-6-8 in unincorporated Alameda County owned by the City and County of San Francisco under the jurisdiction of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission; recommend to the Board of Supervisors approval of the Agreement for the sale and purchase of 262,553 square feet of unimproved land, 186,754 square feet of easement interests, and 1,609.09 linear feet of abutters rights in SFPUC Parcel No. 65 (cumulatively, the Property) for \$152,952 total to the State of California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and the Alameda County Transportation Commission (Alameda CTC) and authorization of the City's Director of Property and/or the SFPUC General Manager to execute deeds conveying fee, easement interests, and abutter's rights interests in the Property to Caltrans and the Alameda CTC; and authorize the General Manager to execute the Sale Agreement upon approval from the Board of Supervisors and Mayor.
