Discussion Topics:

- *Member Sandkulla* asked for clarification on whether the backyard of every house in San Francisco would be assessed. *Staff Novotny* confirmed that was true and that aerial landscaping data would be used to determine the amount of irrigable land.
- Member Nagengast asked whether water run off would be factored into the calculation.
 Staff Novotny stated the technology would have the capacity to note

the difference between run off and irrigable land.

- Chair Clary asked whether the technology could be applied to calculating storm water fees.
 Staff Novotny replied that they haven't thought about using the technology in that capacity yet.
- Chair Clary asked whether the technology would distinguish between plantings and how this would affect their given budget. Staff Novotny responded that the technology would have trouble deciphering the differences between plantings.
- Chair Clary asked how long it would take to get good information from aerial technology.
 Staff Novotny responded that data quality suffers with hilly slopes and

Staff Novotny responded that data quality suffers with hilly slopes and more observation on the ground was needed to compensate.

- Chair Clary questioned whether this policy would motivate people to pave over their irrigatable land. Staff Novotny responded that Clary's point was a large part of the reason for creating an allocation for irrigable land.
- Chair Clary asked about the involvement in the water leaks system. Staff Novotny responded that it was being implemented since mandated water loss reporting started last fall.
- Chair Clary asked about the progress of the mandate. Staff Novotny replied that they were at 8%.
- Chair Clary asked what happened with a California proposal to give credits for recycling water.
 Staff Novotny responded that California decided it would be a 15% credit for reselling recycled water.

 Chair Clary asked about the non-potable water ordinance impact in UCSF Mission Bay.
 Staff Kakee responded that most of UCSE Mission Bay does not have

Staff Kehoe responded that most of UCSF Mission Bay does not have dual plumbing because they are state owned facilities.

- Chair Clary asked if there would be a retrofit requirement to comply with the 2015 non-potable water ordinance.
 Staff Kehoe replied that Scott Wiener did suggest a retro fit but it was ultimately turned down due to costs.
- Member Nagengast asked how much money would be received from the grant program to install recycled water for those buildings that have purple pipes.

Staff Kehoe stated more data are needed to answer that question.

- Committee corrected term to Groundwater supply rather than Groundwater Blending.
- Chair Clary opined that the resolution needed to include a "not to exceed" number for Maximum Containment Levels (MCL).
- Chair Clary asked confirmation on the purpose of the alarm system in the watersheds.

Staff Kehoe confirmed that MCL levels reaching half their capacity triggered the alarm and alerted operator.
